

#### **CYSHCN** Population



#### CYSHCN (as defined by Title V)

"Children with special health care needs (CSHCN) are those who have, or are at risk for a chronic physical, developmental, behavioral, or emotional condition and who also require health and related services of a type or amount beyond that required by children generally."

#### State MCH Priorities



- Women have access to and receive <u>coordinated</u>, <u>comprehensive services</u> before, during and after pregnancy. <u>Women/Maternal</u>
- Services and supports promote <u>healthy family functioning</u>. <u>Cross-cutting</u>
- 3. <u>Developmentally appropriate care and services</u> are provided across the lifespan. Child
- 4. Families are empowered and equipped to make educated choices about <u>infant health and well-being</u>. Perinatal/Infant

#### State MCH Priorities



- 5. Communities and providers/systems of care support physical, social and emotional health. Adolescent
- 6. <u>Professionals have the knowledge and skills</u> to address the needs of maternal and child populations. <u>Cross-cutting</u>
- 7. Services are comprehensive and coordinated across systems and providers. Special Health Care Needs
- 8. Information is available to support <u>informed health decisions</u> and choices. Cross-cutting

#### State Action Plan: Priority 1



- · Women have access to and receive coordinated, comprehensive services before, during and after pregnancy
  - Well woman visit (increase education and access)
  - Prenatal and postnatal risk screening at every visit
  - Prenatal care and education
  - Progesterone as intervention for preterm birth
  - Reduce Early Elective Delivery

Domain: Women & Maternal

Measures: % of women with a past year preventive visit; % preterm births

#### State Action Plan: Priority 2



- · Services and supports promote healthy family functioning
  - Trauma-informed care

  - Father/male engagementEmpower and build strong MCH Advocates
    - Care Coordination
    - Adolescent Caregiver Supports
    - Peer to Peer
  - Home visiting program expansion and referral

 $\textit{Measure}\colon \%$  of children living with parents needing emotional help

### State Action Plan: Priority 3



- Developmentally appropriate care and services are provided across the lifespan

  - Developmental screening 1 month to Kindergarten age
     Motor vehicle safety (car seats size and age appropriate)
  - Home safety (home visits and risk assessments)
  - Physical activity (home based child care and schools)
  - Social-emotional development education (child care)

Domain: Child

Measures: Dev. screening 10-71 mos; injury 0-9 yrs; physical activity 6-17 yrs

#### State Action Plan: Priority 4



- Families are empowered and equipped to make educated choices infant health and well-being
  - Community breastfeeding cross-sector approach
  - Baby Friendly hospitals
  - Nutrition education optimal feeding (prenatal and postpartum)
  - Infant feeding session BAM, other

Domain: Perinatal & Infant

Measures: % ever breastfed, exclusively through 6 mos; safe sleep trainings

# State Action Plan: Priority 5



- Communities and providers support physical, social, and emotional health
- Adolescent immunizations (especially HPV)
- Suicide prevention (assess for risk and intervene)
- Adolescent preventive services (promote and follow up)
- School-based bullying prevention policies and programs
- Positive youth development services/programs

Domain: Adolescent

Measures: % 12-17 yrs bullied or who bully others; % 12-17 yrs last year well visit

#### Key Recommendations Related to Priority 5

- 1. Address the highest priority adolescent health issues.
- Help families support the health and wellbeing of adolescents.
- 3. Provide educational environments that prepare youth for healthy adulthood.
- Encourage collaborations and increase community support for those working for and with youth.
- Improve the responsiveness, availability, and access of health care to youth.

#### State Action Plan: Priority 6



- Professionals have the knowledge and skills to address the needs of maternal and child health populations
- · Smoking/tobacco screening and referral
- Oral health collaboration and preventive services
- Prepared providers (SHCN diversity, inclusion, integration)
- Prepared, qualified workforce (evidence-based services)

#### State Action Plan: Priority 7



- Services are comprehensive and coordinated across systems and providers
- Family satisfaction and provider communication
- Care coordination supports
  - Co-host webinars and/or seminars about care coordination
- Engage families in the co-development of activities
- Integrated systems, increased system collaboration
- Provider training and education (SHCN into adulthood)
   Individual/family support (system navigation life course)
- Domain: Children & Youth with Special Health Care Needs

Domain: Children & Youth with Special Health Care Needs

Measure: % of children with a medical home (with and without SHCN)

#### State Action Plan: Priority 8



- Information is available to support informed health decisions and choices
  - Health information available to families
  - Education and knowledge to support informed health decision-making
  - Partnerships to increase reach and impact of information on healthy decisions and navigating health care/coverage (preschool and school age children)



#### Maternal Health (Priority 1)

- Screening
- Maternal Depression
- Tobacco/smoking
- Education and/or counseling
- Prenatal and postnatal visits
- o Preventive health/well visits
- Referral and follow up

#### Next Steps = Action!



#### Infant Health: Breastfeeding & Safe Sleep (Priority 4)

- · Access and utilize state and local resources
- Reinforce and support messages and programs
- Breastfeeding
  - · Asking, promoting, encouraging
  - Refer for support (LHD, Coalition)
  - Focus on duration and exclusivity
- Safe Sleep (SIDS/SUID Reduction)
- Promote AAP safe sleep guidelines
- Utilize the KIDS Network safe sleep toolkit

#### Next Steps = Action!



# Adolescent Health: Bullying Prevention, Suicide Prevention & Assessment, Well Visits (Priority 5)

- Mental health screening, referral, treatment (Adverse Childhood Experiences – ACEs)
- Substance abuse prevention, screening, referral, treatment
- Suicide risk assessment and response
- Adolescent well visits and contraception (Long Acting Reversible Contraceptives)
- Immunizations per recommended schedule (HPV)

# Next Steps = Action!



#### **Smoking in the Home (Priority 6)**

- Screen for smoking in the home
- Refer and follow up (counseling, intervention, etc.)
- Identify and education regarding increased SIDS/SUID risk
- Support and reinforce what's going on in your community

#### Care Coordination & Medical Home (Priority 7 & 8)

- Care coordination
   What meets the standards?
   What assistance is needed?
- Medical Home
- What components are being integrated?
   What are barriers to becoming a MH?

- Transition Planning
  Incorporate information into visits
  Distribute The Future is Now THINK BIG:
  Preparing for Transition Planning
  (7-13 years; 14-19 years)
