2022 Session Strategy



- Maintain engagement on issues.
- Weekly reports during Session.
- · Weekly policy briefing and discussion on Fridays.
- Engagement with peer organizations to coordinate advocacy and testimony.
- Represent AAP in ongoing collaborative legislative activities.

Legacy Issues Prior to 2022



- 2021 issues were driven by anti-schools, anti-mask; anti-public health, anti-vaccinations, anti-Governor.
- Four main topics:

 - Constitutional amendment on abortion.

 * Done: Constitutional amendment on August 2022 ballot.
 - Rewrite Kansas Emergency Management Act and emergency powers.

 * Done: Gives almost all power to elected officials, reduces local public health authority.

 Pass tax reduction bill the Governor vetoed three times.

 - Done: Passed over Governor's veto.
 Fund schools, non-public schools push.
 - Continued efforts to expand non-public school funding.

2022 were expected to focus on recovery, redistricting, and health.

2022 What Did Not Happen



- Medicaid expansion.
- Vaccination changes.
- Various weapons-related issues, red-flag laws, legal age, prohibition against healthcare questions regarding weapons.
- Medical cannabis.

Legislation Passed 2022



- Medicaid pediatric rate increase \$2.9
- million.

 Extended Medicaid post-partum coverage to twelve months.

 APRN HB 2279. Expanded scope of practice. Removes collaborative practice agreement, but conflicts and legal challenges regarding 'practice of medicine.' Rules and regulations pending and will be legislation in 2023.
- 2023.
 CARE Providers: Policy and funding included as one-year budget agreement. Creates statewide trained healthcare providers to perform child abuse review and evaluation. HB 2632 original bill passed the House. SB 19 implements 988 suicide prevention and mental health crisis hotline in Kansas with \$10 million.

- HB 2106, the gradual reduction of the state sales tax on food.
 HB 2448 SNAP work/training requirements. Passed over veto.
 HB 2387: Prohibits any changes, as well as issuance of an RFP, for Medicaid MCO contracts until January 2023.

Legislative Failures 2022



- SB 34 Vetoed: Would prohibit governmental entities and public officials from requiring. masks in response to any contagious/infectious disease; limits KDHE authority to enforce quarantine and student inoculation requirements if not fully authorized by the FDA.
- SB 55 Vetoed: Require that female student athletic teams only include members who are biologically female.

Governor vetoed and override failed again.

SB 199 Vetoed: Short-term limited duration health plans. HB 2280 (expanding religious exemptions; off-label prescribing) did not advance.

Big Picture 2022



- Election year shaped everything. Redistricting impacted two congressional districts: Kansas City metro and Big First, from Colorado to Lawrence.
- Panasonic battery plant.
- Public health authority: masks and vaccines no change.
- Cash rich budget with surpluses over \$2 billion allowed significant spending, rainy day funds, debt retirement, rate increases (such as Medicaid pediatric rates).
- Education--non-public schools support advanced, critical race theory and DEI issues targeted but no legal change.

Healthcare-related issues going into 2023

- o Care Provider Network permanent legislation.
- Mid-level scope of practice legislation (HB 2279), implementation and rules and regulations will remain alive for 2023. Lack of clarity as to scope of practice.
- HB 2184 (later Sub for SB 158): Medical marijuana. Passed the House, interim committee this fall.
- o Medicaid expansion?
- o Implications of a potential change in administration?

Potential Changes in 2023



- Impact of constitutional amendment vote.
- 2022 All Kansas House of Representatives up for reelection, more conservative leaning, unless amendment voters remain active.
- Derek Schmidt (R) and Dennis Pyle (I) make the Governor's race a toss-up.
- 2022 Kansas U.S. Congressional Representatives up for reelection. Davids (D) vs. Adkins (R) in more conservative district.
- One Kansas U.S. Senate Seat up for reelection (Sen. Moran (R) vs. Holland (D)).
- 2022 elections will impact healthcare, education policy for decades.
